JUNE PROGRAM: DAVID AMES

Wednesday, June 12, 7 pm at St. Luke's Church

Rescheduled from last month's canceled meeting, LPS member David Ames, the retired director of the Center for Historic Architecture and Design at the University of Delaware for 30 years (1984-2014), will talk about urban architectural photography. David has done photography for the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) and Historic American Engineering Record (HAER) of the US Department of Interior. He's submitted many

GETTING READY FOR THE FAIR

Entries opened May 1 for the Kentucky State Fair photo competition. The premium book and online entry form are available at https://kystatefair.org. It's \$15 per entrant, plus \$1 per image entered. You may commit to entering without uploading images, but they must be submitted by July 10 to avoid a \$30 late fee (available until July 17). All entries in print classes will be pre-screened a week after the final deadline; finalists then will be notified to print their images and bring them in the weekend before the Fair (Aug. 10-11) for final judging Aug. 12. Digital entries automatically qualify for final judging. The prescreening is to reduce the number of prints to what will fit within the space allotted for the photo exhibit. Prescreening and final judges are different, and all are different from last year. Digital class winners and non-finalist images will be displayed on giant screens within the exhibit area. The fair runs Aug. 15-25.



Check-in volunteers needed

Again LPS has been asked to handle check-in of photo entries for the Fair on Aug. 10-11. Members will perform triage to make sure photos are prepared properly, check entrants in through entry books and help hang photos as they are received. Extra help with rehanging Aug. 12-13 and entrant pickup Aug. 26 would be appreciated, too. Signup sheets will be distributed at the June meeting.



The Indiana State Fair Arts entry book is online at indianastatefair. com: entries opened May 16 for the fair Aug. 2-18. Entry in photography costs \$30 plus 50 cents per item (\$2 per item in professional divisions) but includes six admission tickets. Check-in will be July 26-27. Entries are restricted to Indiana residents only.

This month in LPS history

82 years ago: The Louisville Movie Club held its second Camera Club Jamboree at the Plantation Club in the Seelbach Hotel. featuring live entertainment, live models and photofloods; more than 150 photographers attended ... the club meeting June 9 was held at the Fraternal Order of Eagles club rooms, 3908 Frankfort Ave. (where the 3900 Shelbyville Road building is now), and featured the showing of movies and stills taken at the Jamboree. **80 years ago:** The monthly meeting June 15 at the Seelbach featured two 16mm sound films, "How Motion Pictures Move and Talk," and "18th Century Life in Williamsburg, Va.," and discussion of the print assignment, "Flowers" ... Judging for the first Louisville International Salon of Photography took place June 3 in the Gold Room of the Seelbach Hotel; the exhibition of winning prints was June 19-26 at the Arts Club galleries in the Watterson Hotel. LPS members with photos in the show included Jacques Lee Simson and Frank Von Allmen. **79 years ago:** The monthly meeting June 21 at the Watterson Hotel included the showing of a members' movie and a technical demonstration and exhibition of multiple and single toning of prints by member Maj. John Lallinger; the print

LPS HISTORY: THE MOVIE LADY

She joined LPS in April 1944, soon after it had changed its name from the Louisville Movie Club. But Lillian McNulty's interest was always the movies. After getting her teaching degree at the University of Louisville, the 1911 Mercy graduate started the first student film club in a Louisville school, the Photoplay Club at Barret Junior High in 1934. Using ninth graders as actors, she co-filmed the first Louisville school movie. "The Lady of the Lake," a 35-minute film based on the poem by Walter Scott, in 1937. Her personal movie of the 1937 Kentucky Derby was chosen as one of 10 outstanding films submitted to the International Show of

Amateur Motion Pictures in New York. Two years later, she helped produce "Gold! Gold!! Gold!!!" at the University of Kentucky Grade School, with fifthgraders acting and helping write the script; that too made it to the New York film show.

After receiving the first master's degree in visual aids ever granted by the University of Kentucky, she spent World War II teaching cartography courses for the Army Map Service and then became Louisville's first curriculum assistant director for audio-visual education in 1944. Joining LPS, she stayed in the club into the next decade, serving periodically on LPS' motion-picture committee.

LPS HISTORY: THE MOVIE LADY

But her rise continued as in 1947 she became the Louisville schools' first supervisor of visual aids; in her three years as assistant, she had increased visual-aid films from 120 to 500, motion-picture projectors from 3 to 7 and film strips from zero to 10; the school system also added six record players, a transcription player and three audio-visual catalogs.

Movies are "opening up new avenues for learning," especially among slow-reading pupils, she told the Courier-Journal in 1946. Children who are painful readers often show surprising ability at learning via movies or records, she

explained. They may spot relationships between facts in the movies which even the teacher misses. By 1949, 60 of 75 Louisville public schools had their own

equipment — motion-picture projectors, film strip, slide and opaque projectors, with an average of 230 educational films circulating daily. By 1948 the film library contained material on 625 subjects.

In 1950, she was on the planning committee (with director of curriculum and research Robert Allen and LFPL radio director H.E. Salley) for a school radio station that broadcast educational programs daily to 20 elementary schools. Later on, secondary schools were to be added as well as live student productions. Then she was chairman of the committee that converted the old Dumesnil House adjacent to Barret Junior High into a private club and official headquarters for the Louisville Education Association and its departments.

After retiring from teaching in the 1950s, she stayed active in volunteer organizations and promoted the use of visual-aid materials in the schools for years. She died in 1977.

40 years ago: Category was In Motion. Winners were Harold Rea (slides), John Holliday (b/w prints) and L.E. Sanborn (color prints) ... Ethel Stoke presented "Amazon," a slideshow of her trip to the South American river jungle ... LPS took a field trip June 23 to Camp Merry Ledges on the Blue River in Indiana.

35 years ago: Category was Wildflowers. Winners were Marge Griffin (slides), Ron Lehocky (color prints) and Menta DeLeuil (b/w prints); judge was Pat Dobbins ... Program was a slideshow of the winners in the Kentucky Natural History Society's "A Day of Nature in Kentuckiana" photo competition.

30 years ago: Category was Closeups. Winners were Bill Rhodes (slides), David Pond (color prints) and Mark Humphrey (b/w prints); judge was Pat Dobbins ...The program topic was not printed in the newsletter.

25 years ago: Category was Floral. Winners were Deborah Brownstein (color prints), Greta Garbo (b/w prints) and Fred Englemann (slides); judge was Dr. Varley Weedeman ... Program was a slideshow, "Gorges, Glaciers and Geysers," by LPS member Babs Brant as her

farewell to the club (moving to Florida).

20 years ago: Category was Fences. Winners were Deborah Brownstein (color prints), T.Y. Huang (b/w prints) and Gertrude Hudson (slides) ... There was no June newsletter.

15 years ago: Category was Moving Water. Winners were David Becker (digitals), Fred Engelmann (slides), Deborah Brownstein (color prints), Jozsef Szilagyi (monochrome) and John Corbett (novice); judge was Albert Schneider ... Program was a selection of historical images from the Kentucky Derby Photo Archives — and behind-the-scenes images of how the race is photographed each year — by its president, Ray Schuhmann.

10 years ago: Category was People at Work. Winners were George Sherrard (digitals), Steve Cowherd (color prints), Nick Roberts (monochrome prints) and Kevin Turner (novice); judge was John Adams ... LPS member Kenny Pritchett presented a slideshow, "Santa Fe: A Photographer's Paradise."

Five years ago: Category was Triptych. Advanced winners were Hap Jones (digitals) and Kay Sherrard (color and monochrome prints); amateur winners were Carolyn Hawkins, B.J. Sorenson (color prints) and Deborah Hennessey (monochrome prints); judge was Carole Baker ... Ted Tarquinio presented a slideshow recounting the Triple Crown races ... LPS' Ray Turner, who worked more than 25 years for BellSouth and was a professional photographer for more than 30 years, died June 22. He was 75.

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 1 MB, with no more than 1024 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.

FAVORITE SHOT: JOHN HULTGREN



After Memorial Day I spent a few days hiking in Breaks Interstate Park, also known as "The Breaks," a bi-state park spanning nearly 5,000 acres located partly in southeastern Kentucky and southwestern Virginia in the Jefferson National Forest at the northeastern terminus of Pine Mountain, nestled in the heart of the Appalachian Mountains. This is a shot of The Towers from the Mill Rock Overlook, so named because sandstone was cut into mill stones here. The elevation at the overlook is 1,630 feet and the elevation of the river is 1,040 feet, making the overlook elevation 1,590 feet.
