This month in LPS history

111 years ago: Bertha Scott of Midway sweeps the blue ribbons in the first Kentucky State Fair photography competition, winning in landscape, aquatic and animals. Each first place pays \$2 (about \$60 today). **80 years ago:** The monthly meeting Sept. 21 in the Leather Room of the Seelbach Hotel featured a 16mm film, "Niagara Falls," by J. Carl Finger, and a 100-foot section of Ansco color film exposed by Carl Nachod, who also showed 35mm color slides from a recent vacation in Atlantic City, NJ. Also, Capt. Walter Wilson presented his 4x5 camera made from sundry odd parts and made to resemble a Speed Graphic; 12 prints were submitted in the "Summer Sports" category, led by a print by L.W. Kerr showing his daughter Patsy steering a sailboat. 70 years ago: Two LPS members win blue ribbons in photography – Agnes Bettag (still life) and Hawes Fisher (portrait). Bettag also gets second and third in natural history and third in portrait; Fisher also gets a second in still life.

65 years ago: Judging was held for the international exhibition in the Photographic Society of America convention, to be held in Louisville for the only time Oct. 6-10 at the Kentucky Hotel. Of 1,431 prints submitted in three classes (pictorial, nature, color), 328 were chosen; of 4,759 slides (color, nature, stereo), 1,379 were selected. **55 years ago:** LPS member (and IU

Southeast faculty member) Menta DeLeuil was the State Fair judge.

40 years ago: Category was Member's Choice. Winners were Marge Griffin (slides), John Baxter (b/w prints) and Bob Dentinger (color prints); judge was Patti Dobbins ... Member William Sims presented three movies — "Dream of Beauty," time-lapse photography of flowers; "The Painted Forest," of New England's trees in autumn; and "On Wings of the Wind," a Sunday afternoon sail on a racing yacht ... Dorothy Hensley announced the creation of the Vincent Hensley Award for best State Fair black and white photograph, to start in 1985 and memorialize her late husband, a longtime LPS member and 1960 club president, who died in 1980 ... State Fair blue-ribbon winners - Ethel Stoke, Julian Sacksteder, Hawes Fisher, Benita Niemann, L.E. Sanborn and Jack Baxter. 35 years ago: Category was Water Scenics.

LPS HISTORY: T. NORBERT KENDE

Only once has the Photographic Society of America held a national convention in Louisville. That was in October 1959, and the event will be featured here next month on its 65th anniversary. It was co-sponsored by LPS and the Kentucky Society of Natural History. And most responsible was a movie-making psychiatrist and former LPS president, T. Norbert Kende. "If you eat steak three times a day, you get tired of it," he told the Courier-Journal. "You have to have chicken once in a while. (Movie-making) is my chicken, my relief. It makes me a better physician."

Born in Hungary, Kende came to the US in 1923. After 15 years practicing

with the Veterans Administration at five different hospitals, he moved to Louisville in 1942 to head the psychiatry department at Central State Hospital. His goal then was to modernize the department and establish a balance between work and recreation to promote successful rehabilitation. His wife, Helen, took charge of the hospital's social welfare department, primarily doing follow-ups with patients who had been paroled. Moving later into private practice, he acquired a reputation as an expert psychiatric witness and testified many times in local court cases. He joined LPS in 1949 and very quickly became an

enthusiastic and influential member. He was elected to the board in 1950. He was on the International Salon committee in 1951; the next year he became LPS vice president for movies and overall salon chairman. In 1953, he was elected LPS president and won his first national award – the PSA's first award for movies, for a film he made in California describing an easterner's view of the West. Two years later, he worked with other LPS movie-makers to produce "My Kentucky," a travelogue film of the state that was shown through the state and region, and even Australia.

"I'm unquestionably a camera addict," said Kende, who filmed travelogues all over the United States, Canada, Mexico, Central and South America, and showed them around the area. He was the local salon's only movie chairman (1955-58), donating a sterling silver trophy to the topjudged film each year. And after the 1953 PSA film award, he became a member of the PSA's Motion Picture Council and set about trying to lure the group's convention to Louisville.

He finally succeeded in 1959 (more on that next month) and was the convention's general chairman; one casualty, though, was the end of Louisville's international salon (although the natural history salon lasted through 1986). Kende retired from medical practice in 1961 and moved to Florida the next year. His wife died there in 1973 at age 73. Kende died in 1977 at age 81.

Program was a slideshow, "One Person's View of Russia," by Mary Wilkerson ... Fair blueribbon winners — Ethel Stoke (Best of Show color, color animals) and Lynn Shea (Best of Show black and white, b/ w unclassified).

30 years ago: Category was Patterns. Winners were Al Boice (slides), Woody Drumheller (color prints) and Mark Humphrey (b/w prints); judge was Jerry Spanyer ...The program was "Electronic Imaging and Photography: The Marriage of the Century," from Woody Drumheller ... Fair blue ribbons — David Young (color unclassified/Best of Show), Beverly Ballantine (color portraits), David Rosenberg (color scenic), Bob Wells (color animals), Mark Humphrey (mono floral), Ethel Stoke (mono children).

25 years ago: Category was Scenics. Winners were Lynn Shea (color prints), Ted Lissauer (b/w prints) and T.Y. Huang (slides); judge was John Nation ... Program was a slideshow from Barbara Friedland of the Louisville Visual Arts Association ... Fair blue ribbons — Bob Wells (mono portraits/Hensley Award, mono animals, mono children), Bob Dorzback (mono scenics).

20 years ago: Category was Floral. Winners were Patty Colston (color prints), Bob Dorzback (b/w prints) and Byron Butler (slides); judge was Lynn Shea ... Program was a slideshow by Courier-Journal photographer Bill Luster, "Reflections on Louisville Light," all shot in warm light during the magic hour ... Fair blue ribbons — Patty Colston (mono portraits, Hensley Award), Bob Wells (mono unclassified, best monochrome), Bill Rhodes (mono human interest).

15 years ago: Category was People at Work. Winners were Deborah Brownstein (digitals), Gertrude Hudson (slides), David Becker (color prints), Bob Canova (monochrome) and John Corbett (novice); judge was Eric Link ... Speakers were David Becker and Al Wollerton (theater, low light photography, setting up online storefronts), and Fred Engelmann (a 40-year retrospective) ... Fair blue ribbons — Kevin Laundroche (best digital, color unclassified), Al Wollerton (mono animals), Jim Ofcacek (mono scenic), Kay Sherrard (color scenic).

10 years ago: Category was Long Exposure. Winners were David Becker (digitals), John Holthaus (color prints), Steve Cowherd (monochrome prints) and Stephanie Turner (novice); judge was Joey Goldsmith ... The Courier-Journal's Bill Luster presented a slideshow ... Fair blue ribbons — Catherine Balfe (color unclassified), John Holthaus (color nature) ... Katie Cowherd became club secretary, replacing Catherine Balfe, who remained club treasurer.

Five years ago: Category was People and Hats. Advanced winners were Kelly Davenport (digitals) and Ted Heitzman (color and mono prints); amateur winner was B.J. Sorenson, who swept digitals and color and mono prints; judges were Greg Miller and W.J. Thompson ... Owner Shah Javid and lead framer Pam Patenaude from Masters Frame Shop & Supply in Clarksville, IN, spoke about the benefits of framing ... Fair blue ribbons: Aspiring — Barbara Harris (color wildlife), Alexandria Ruhs (color unclassified); Accomplished — Al Wollerton (mono wildlife, best mono in show), David Kelm (mono unclassified, Hensley Award), Christine Hayden (mono scenic), George Sherrard (color unclassified), Kay Sherrard (color digital, Our Kentucky); Student — Robert Sherrard (best monochrome).

ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 2 MB, with no more than 2000 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.





CATEGORY DESCRIPTIONS

Here are the category descriptions for the next three LPS monthly competitions:

September (Abstracts): An abstract relies on conceptual ideas and visual design principles to create photos that elevate qualities other than a subject's literal and obvious characteristics. Examples:

**Obscured subject, or recognizable subject presented in an uncommon way;

**Lack of context, including obscured scale;

**Study of shapes, lines, repetition, light, movement, texture, color or rhythm instead of a literal subject or scene; **Intangible qualities: intrigue, mystery, prompting curiosity, raising questions, or the element of surprise.

October (Minimalism): A form of photography that is distinguished by austere simplicity. It emphasizes sparseness and careful composition, shying away from overabundance of color, patterns, or information.

November (Street shots w/People): Street photography depicts people in everyday life in everyday environments. The aim is to capture spontaneous moments of people in their candid, most authentic state. A street does not necessarily have to be in the photo.




