
#### THIS MONTH IN LPS HISTORY

84 years ago: On Feb. 5, about two dozen motion-picture enthusiasts met at the Watterson Hotel to form the Louisville Movie Club, the first all-color amateur movie-making club in the United States. By the end of the year, the club had more than 30 memberships. The first president was Courier-Journal photo director and rotogravure editor Harold Rhodenbaugh, who left in May 1942 to become Capt. Rhodenbaugh of the Army Air Corps; four months later he'd moved to New York to work for Look magazine.

83 years ago: On Feb. 9, the Louisville Movie Club held its first "get-acquainted party" and jamboree for photographers in the Rathskeller and Plantation Club at the Seelbach Hotel. The program included an illustrated lecture on color film and then free rein to shoot anything - with floodlights and flash bulbs provided — at the nightclub performances that night. 80 years ago: The club held its annual meeting in the Seelbach's Junior Ballroom and 56 attended. The treasurer reported that LPS gained 12 memberships (to 47) and 19 people (to 81) in 1944, and turned a profit of \$152.70; the Seelbach meeting room rental was \$3.50 a month. ... Andrew Thome had two photos printed and J.E. Payton one in the "Scenic South" publication of Standard Oil of Kentucky. ... Gus Brakmeier capped the evening with a performance of magic.

**64 years ago:** Vincent Hensley (for whom the State Fair's best monochrome photo award is named) was elected LPS president ... Vincent's wife, Dorothy, was named secretary.

**60 years ago:** William Sims was re-elected LPS president; joining him on the board were Bill Rhodes, VP for movies; Bill Clark, VP for stills; and Mrs. Durward Phelps, secretary ... Year-end winners: Floyd

Allen (best color slide), Rhodes (best 8mm movie), Sims (best 16mm movie) and Vincent and Dorothy Hensley (best slide travelogue). **55 years ago:** Robert Wallace was elected LPS president ... Year-end winners: Marge Griffin (slides), Zana Naake (prints), Eugene Hack (slide points), Wallace (print points), William Sims (best movie) and Arthur Frankhouser (community service).

Currie (best b/w print), Lennox

45 years ago: Monthly category was Portraits (people) ... Winners were Bill Rhodes (slides), Bob Dentinger (b/w prints) and Hawes Fisher (color prints) ... Program for the Feb. 13 meeting was a portrait photography demonstration by Jerry Spanyer ... The Feb. 15 banquet at the Breckinridge Inn featured a program on "Photography and the News" by Marvin Meyerhoffer of WLKY-32. Cost was \$5. ... John Hamlyn was elected president, replacing Charles Bailey ... Year-end winners: Bill

Clark (slides), Fisher (color prints), Al Boice (b/w prints), Bill Rhodes (8mm movie), Chester FitzZaland (slide points), Alan Shadburne (b/w points), Ethel Stoke (color points) and Glen Warren (slideshow and community service).

**40 years ago:** Monthly category was Glass, and the Feb. 13 meeting program was "The Answer," an audiovisual slide show by Howard and Nancy Fitch, on how to solve common photography problems ... Winners were Paul Roberts (slides), Larry Morgan (b/w prints) and Ethel Stoke (color prints); judge was David Byrd ... The banquet was Feb. 16 at the Kosair Temple (\$8 per person), with speaker Paul Schuhmann presenting a slideshow of animal photography ... Year-end winners: Marge Griffin (best slide), Harold Rea (slide points), Bob Dentinger (best color print), Ethel Stoke (color print points), Jack Baxter (best b/w print and b/w print points), Bill Rhodes (8mm movie), Glen Warren (slideshow) and Menta

Year-end winners: Gertrude Hudson (best slide and slide points), Ron Lehocky (best color print), Woody Drumheller (color print points), Sandy Nabb (best b/w print), Mark Humphrey (b/w print points) and Bill Rhodes (community service); judge was John Nation. **25 years ago:** No competition; a demonstration program, with representatives from Murphy's, Schuhmann's, Whittenberg's, Fulltone, Kinetic, Reliable and Chuck Rubin. Demonstrations of digital photography, photo retouching and Photoshop ... The banquet was Feb. 19 at the Bardstown Road Holiday Inn (\$18 per person) ... Year-end winners: Bob Dorzback (best color print and b/w print points), Ted Lissauer (best b/w print), Lynn Shea (color print points), Fred Engelmann (best slide and slide points), Bill Rhodes (community service) and Gertrude Hudson (President's Award); judge was Bill Luster.

20 years ago: Category was Close-Ups. Winners were Al Wollerton (color prints), T.Y. Huang (b/w prints) and Fred Engelmann (slides); the judges were Ethel Stoke, Ron Lehocky and Byron Butler ... The meeting program was a 3D presentation on the digital projector by Duke Marsh ... 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#### ABOUT THE LOUISVILLE PHOTOGRAPHIC SOCIETY

Membership in LPS is open to everyone. You must be a paid member of LPS to submit photos for competition. There are two divisions of competition, Amateur and Advanced, and three categories in each division, Color Prints, Monochrome Prints, and Digital submissions. No more than two entries are allowed per category, and you may enter in only one division each month. Digital images must be submitted **no later than two weeks before the meeting** and must be no larger than 2 MB, with no more than 2000 pixels on the long side at a resolution of no higher than 120 DPI.

You MUST compete at the Advanced level if:

- · You are a professional photographer (you earn more than 50% of your annual income from photography).
- · You have had a juried gallery showing.
- · If you are an accomplished photographer and are not in the above groups, you are encouraged to enter at the Advanced level.
